1 Peter 1:17-23

If you invoke as Father the one who judges impartially according to each person's work, live in fear during the time of your exile. ¹⁸ You know you were ransomed from the futile conduct inherited from your ancestors, not with perishable things like silver or gold ¹⁹ but with the precious blood of Christ, like that of a lamb without defect or blemish. ²⁰ He was destined before the foundation of the world but was revealed at the end of the ages for your sake. ²¹ Through him you have come to trust in God, who raised him from the dead and gave him glory, so your trust and hope are in God.

²² Now that you have purified your souls by your obedience to the truth, so you have genuine mutual affection, love one another deeply from the heart. ²³ You have been born anew, not of perishable but of imperishable seed, through the living and enduring word of God.

As most of you know, James was a big believer in works. That he who has faith MUST have works. Here in 1 Peter, we are reading: If you invoke as Father the one who judges impartially according to *each person's work,"* which is equally clear Peter believed in works, then we may logically conclude works are VERY important. It is one thing to say, "I have great faith," but it sends a whole different message if we have no works to back up our great faith. That is, if we do not ACT on our faith in ways that express our belief, especially when it comes to loving our neighbor as ourselves, helping the poor, the lame, the deaf and the blind. In other words, if we are not helping those who need help. What if Jesus had ensured his disciples did all he asked of them? What if Jesus was a tough manager of all his followers?

A manager and a sales rep stood looking at a map on which colored pins indicated the company representative in each area. "I'm not going to fire you, Wilson," the manager said, "but I'm loosening your pin a bit just to emphasize the insecurity of your situation."

Would Jesus loosen your colored pin? Threaten you with being removed from the map of his followers? Are you one of his hard, diligent workers or are you finding yourself in a precarious state?

Let us be secure in our discipleship. Let us provide works with our faith.

How and why we worship in the Christian Church (Disciples of Christ) continued:

Obviously, what Disciples do when we gather to worship does not differ greatly from what is done by other Christians. Three practices are particularly noteworthy, however. These three involve the way in which the **Lord's Supper** is celebrated in all Disciples congregations.

First, we observe the Lord's Supper *weekly* as one of the twin focal points of our worship. We understand this to have been the practice of the early church.

Second, we invite *all* persons who follow Christ to participate in the Lord's Supper. The church erects no artificial barriers to sharing the loaf and cup.

Third, *lay* elders and deacons prepare, celebrate, and serve the Lord's Supper. Although the clergy may participate in this act of worship, the presence of an ordained minister is not imperative.

What happens when Christians gather to worship has been one of the central questions which has emerged from our conversations with other churches. This is as it should be, because worship is the very heart of our life together as the people of God.

Whether or not it occurs during the Sunday morning worship service, or at some other time, **baptism** calls a congregation together. Parallel to the Lord's Supper in its importance, baptism is an event where God's presence and action command the attention of the congregation. When someone who has professed faith in Christ is immersed in water in front of the church, we see the visible sign of what happens inwardly when one dies to sin, is raised to new life in Christ, and becomes a members of the body of Christ – the church.

In addition to the Sunday morning service, many **other occasions** call Christians to worship. Devotional services in fellowship meetings, church business sessions, and prayer groups are a part of the worship life in many congregations. Many churches participate in an international chain of prayer by holding a 24 hour prayer vigil each year. Private devotional life on the part of the church members undergirds the corporate worship activity of a congregation.

Events in the life of God's people are occasions for worship: ordaining a man or woman to the ministry, installing church officers, dedicating buildings, and celebrating anniversaries. And events in the lives of individual Christians, such as weddings and funerals, provide settings to support one another in love and to renew our understanding of life.

Customarily, cultural and secular concerns, such as Mother's Day and Labor Day, have influenced worship services. The Week of Compassion and other emphases of the mission of the church determine the direction of worship on certain Sundays. Occasions such as World Communion Sunday or the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity evoke ecumenically shared concerns in worship.

The United States was one of the first countries in the world to celebrate Arbor Day, a holiday dedicated to tree planting.

National Arbor Day in the USA is celebrated on the last Friday in April.

Besides, each state celebrates its own state tree planting holiday. Arbor Day was founded by Julius Sterling Morton, a Nebraska newspaper editor, agriculturalist and statesman. Morton was a respected agriculturalist fascinated with trees, he planted numerous trees on his estate.

Currently, his former mansion and estate serve as Arbor Lodge State Historical Park. Morton came up with the idea of celebrating Arbor Day in the early 1870s. The first celebration was held in Nebraska on April 10, 1872.

Its participants planted an estimated one million trees throughout the state. By the 1920s, each state had passed laws that stipulated a certain day to be state Arbor Day. In some states, the holiday was named Arbor and Bird Day. In Nebraska, Arbor Day is a civic holiday. National Arbor Day in the United States was established as a state holiday in 1885.

It was moved from April 10 (its original date proposed by Morton) to April 22 (Morton's birthday). In 1989, the holiday was moved to the last Friday in April. On this day, Americans are encouraged to plant trees, bushes and plants (if weather conditions allow) and care for their national environment.

When doors are left open, the heat goes up the staircases to the hallway and upper rooms and the A/C goes into rooms we are not using downstairs.

In the area where the water fountain and women's restroom are, the door going up the steps into back of the sanctuary and the door in the hallway leading to HeBrews need to be kept closed.

The Journey Sunday School Class will continue our study of

The Gospel of Matthew

We hope you will join us.

The Journey class meets in the Library in the Community Center.

The Gospel of Matthew is the first book of the New Testament of the Bible and one of the three synoptic Gospels. It tells how Israel's Messiah, Jesus, comes to his people and forms a community of disciples, of how he taught the people through such events as the Sermon on the Mount and its Beatitudes, and how Israel becomes divided and how Jesus condemns this hostile Israel. This culminates in his departure from the Temple and his execution. At this point many people reject Jesus, and on his resurrection he sends the disciples to the gentiles.

Matthew seems to emphasize that the Jewish tradition should not be lost in a church that was increasingly becoming gentile. The gospel reflects the struggles and conflicts between the evangelist's community and the other Jews, particularly with its sharp criticism of the scribes and Pharisees with the position that through their rejection of Christ, the Kingdom of God has been taken away from them and given instead to the church. The divine nature of Jesus was a major issue for the Matthaean community, the crucial element separating the early Christians from their Jewish neighbors; while Mark begins with Jesus' baptism and temptations, Matthew goes back to Jesus' origins, showing him as the Son of God from his birth, the fulfillment of messianic prophecies of the Old Testament. The title Son of David identifies Jesus as the healing and miracle-working Messiah of Israel (it is used exclusively in relation to miracles), sent to Israel alone. As Son of Man he will return to judge the world, an expectation which his disciples recognize but of which his enemies are unaware. As Son of God, God is revealing himself through his son, and Jesus proving his sonship through his obedience and example. Most scholars believe the gospel was composed between AD 80 and 90, with a range of possibility between AD 70 to 110; a pre-70 date remains a minority view. The work does not identify its author, and the early tradition attributing it to the apostle Matthew is rejected by modern scholars. He was probably a male Jew, standing on the margin between traditional and non-traditional Jewish values, and familiar with technical legal aspects of scripture being debated in his time. Writing in a polished Semitic "synagogue Greek", he drew on the Gospel of Mark as a source, plus a hypothetical collection of sayings known as the Q source (material shared with Luke but not with Mark) and hypothetical material unique to his own community, called the M source or "Special Matthew".




