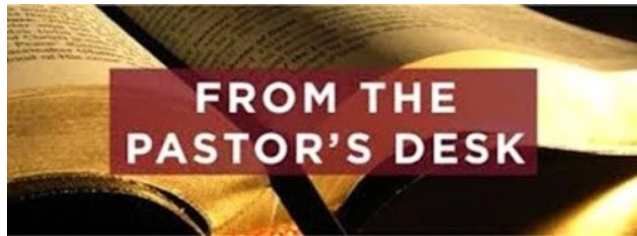

## **John 20:19-23**

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors were locked where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, “Peace be with you.”<sup>20</sup> After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord.<sup>21</sup> Jesus said to them again, “Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.”<sup>22</sup> When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, “Receive the Holy Spirit.”

Most people never think about how important breathing is. Why? Because it’s taken for granted, like, “Of course it’s important! I don’t have to think about it! We can’t live without breathing!” And therein lies the point, “We don’t have to think about it.” It just happens naturally. But not for everyone. We know there are people who have to carry an oxygen pack or tank in order to breathe. We know there are breathing disorders and those who stop breathing in their sleep, which creates a need for a CPAP machine. In other words, generally speaking, we do take breathing for granted.

The same is true for the Holy Spirit. That is, we take it for granted the Holy Spirit is filling us every day, sustaining us, and lifting us. Yet, we do nothing to feed ourselves spiritually to ensure we are sustained by the Holy Spirit. Jesus said, “Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you.” When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, “Receive the Holy Spirit.” Truth is, many of us do not RECEIVE the Holy Spirit. We don’t allow the Holy Spirit to work in our lives. The Holy Spirit is like essential oxygen to continue in the steps of Christ. It is our CPAP machine when we stop breathing the Gospel into our lives. To have true PEACE in our lives, we need the Holy Spirit, that is, we need to RECEIVE the Holy Spirit into our lives every day. Will today be the day you receive the Holy Spirit?

I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. <sup>35</sup>“By this everyone will know you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.”



Originally called Decoration Day, from the early tradition of decorating graves with flowers, wreaths and flags, Memorial Day is a day for remembrance of those who have died in service to our country. It was first widely observed on May 30, 1868 to commemorate the sacrifices of Civil War soldiers, by proclamation of Gen. John A. Logan of the Grand Army of the Republic, an organization of former Union sailors and soldiers.

During that first national commemoration, former Union Gen. and sitting Ohio Congressman James Garfield made a speech at Arlington National Cemetery, after which 5,000 participants helped to decorate the graves of the more than 20,000 Union and Confederate soldiers who were buried there.

This event was inspired by local observances of the day that had taken place in several towns throughout America in the three years after the Civil War. In 1873, New York was the first state to designate Memorial Day as a legal holiday. By the late 1800s, many more cities and communities observed Memorial Day, and several states had declared it a legal holiday. After World War I, it became an occasion for honoring those who died in all of America's wars and was then more widely established as a national holiday throughout the United States.

World Environment Day is a global platform for public outreach, with participation from over 143 countries annually, including participation from:

Argentina, Australia, Austria, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Denmark, Finland, France, Germany, India, Israel, Italy, Japan, Mexico, the Netherlands, Norway, the Philippines, Poland, South Africa, Spain, Switzerland, Thailand and the United States.

Every year, the program has provided a theme and forum for businesses, non-government organizations, communities, politicians and stars to advocate environmental causes.



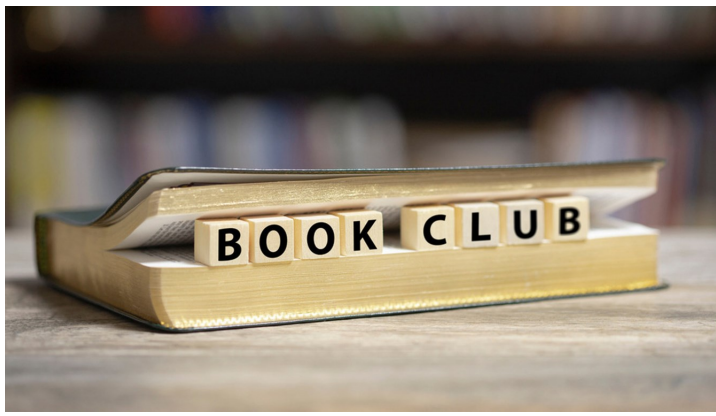
**JUNE 8<sup>TH</sup>**

The World Ocean Day 2026 Action Theme – **Strong Marine Protected Areas for Our Blue Planet** – will guide global action over the coming years. It brings together the momentum of recent multi-year action themes – *Catalyzing Ocean-Climate Action* and *Protecting at Least 30% of Lands, Waters, and Ocean by 2030 (30x30)* – and aligns powerfully with the recent ratification of the High Seas Treaty to protect biodiversity beyond national jurisdiction.

World leaders have committed to 30x30 both within national waters and across the High Seas – an area covering two-thirds of the ocean and nearly one-half of Earth’s surface. *Now they need to follow through!* These ocean waters regulate the climate, support extraordinary biodiversity, sustain livelihoods, and hold untapped scientific and medical potential.

Creating strongly regulated Marine Protected Areas (MPAs) is essential to turning global commitments into real conservation outcomes. Implementation will require collective effort, accountability, and sustained public engagement – but if we work together, it is definitely achievable by 2030!

By uniting around World Ocean Day each June, we can accelerate progress and help create a global network of MPAs that restores ecosystems, builds resilience, and inspires hope for the future.

**THE SONG OF THE BLUE BOTTLE TREE**

Genevieve Charbonneau talks to ghosts and has a special relationship with rattlesnakes. In her travels, she's wandered throughout the South, escaping a mental hospital in Alabama, working for a Louisiana circus, and dancing at a hoochy-kootch in Texas. Now for the first time in a decade, she's allowed her winding path to bring her to the site of her grandmother's Arkansas farmhouse, a place hallowed in her memory.

She intends only to visit briefly – to pay respects to her buried loved ones and leave. But a chance meeting with a haunted young Vietnam vet reconnects her with the remnants of a family she thought long gone, and their union becomes a catalyst for change and salvation. An abused woman and her daughters develop the courage to fight back, a ghost finds the path away from life, and a sanctimonious predator becomes the prey. In the process, Genevieve must choose between her longing for meaningful connection after years as an outsider and her equally excruciating impulse to run.

Written by a naturalist and set on the land where her family roots stretch back two centuries, *The Song of the Blue Bottle Tree* is a haunting story about letting go and the things we leave behind, the power of names, and the ties that bind. It is both harrowing and triumphant, a visceral Southern debut as otherworldly and beautiful as it is unflinching and wry.



**Global Wind Day** or **World Wind Day** is a **worldwide event** held on **June 15**. It is organized by **WindEurope** and **GWEC (Global Wind Energy Council)**. It is a day when **wind energy** is celebrated, information is exchanged and adults and children find out about wind energy, its power and the possibilities it holds to **change the world**.

In association with EWEA and GWEC, national wind energy associations and companies involved in wind energy production organize events in many countries around the world. In 2011, there were events organized in 30 countries, on 4 continents. Events included visits to onshore and offshore wind farms, information campaigns, demonstration turbines being set up in cities, wind workshops and a wind parade. Many events happened on Global Wind Day (15 June) itself, but there were also events on the days and weeks before and afterwards. In 2012 there were 250 events around the globe and a popular photo competition.



## FRIDAY, JUNE 19, 2026

Juneteenth, also known as Freedom Day, Jubilee Day, Cel-Liberation Day or the Black Fourth of July, is an American holiday that commemorates June 19, 1865.

On this day, after almost two and half years since the implementation of the Emancipation Proclamation, enslaved African Americans were informed of their liberation from the slavery present in the former Confederate States of America. Texas was the most remote of the slave states, and the Emancipation Proclamation of January 1, 1863, was not enforced there until after the Civil War had ended. The name of the observance is a portmanteau of "June" and "nineteenth", the date of its celebration.

At first celebrations involved church-centered community gatherings in Texas. It spread across the South and became more commercialized in the 1920s and 1930s. Often the centerpiece was a food festival. A third stage was reached in the Civil Rights movement of the 1960s, when the focus became the story of struggle for postwar civil rights. The 1970s saw a fourth stage, which returned the focus to African American freedom and arts. By the 21st century Juneteenth was celebrated in most major cities across the United States. Activists are pushing Congress to recognize Juneteenth as a national holiday. Juneteenth is recognized as a state holiday or special day of observance in 46 of the 50 states.

Observance is primarily in local celebrations. Traditions include public readings of the Emancipation Proclamation, singing traditional songs such as "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" and "Lift Every Voice and Sing", and reading of works by noted African-American writers such as Ralph Ellison and Maya Angelou. Celebrations include rodeos, street fairs, cookouts, family reunions, park parties, historical reenactments, or Miss Juneteenth contests.



## **What is World Refugee Day?**

World Refugee Day is an international day designated by the United Nations to honor refugees around the globe. It falls each year on 20 June and honors the strength and courage of people who have been forced to flee their home country to escape conflict or persecution.

## **Why is World Refugee Day important?**

World Refugee Day shines a light on the rights, needs and dreams of refugees, helping to mobilize political will and resources so refugees can not only survive but thrive. While it is important to protect and improve the lives of refugees every single day, international days like World Refugee Day help to focus global attention on the plight of those fleeing conflict or persecution. Many activities held on World Refugee Day create opportunities to support refugees.

## **When is World Refugee Day and when did it start?**

World Refugee Day falls each year on 20 June and is dedicated to refugees around the globe. World Refugee Day was held globally for the first time on 20 June 2001 to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the 1951 Convention relating to the Status of Refugees. It was originally known as Africa Refugee Day, before the United Nations General Assembly officially designated it as an international day in December 2000.

## **What happens on World Refugee Day?**

Each year, World Refugee Day is marked by a variety of events in many countries around the globe in support of refugees. These activities are led by or involve refugees themselves, government officials, host communities, companies, celebrities and schoolchildren among others.

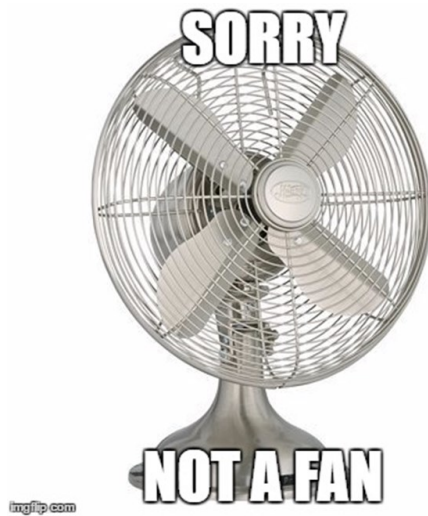
### ***DEACONS***

### ***MINISTER***

The Minister of the congregation ***shall be the chief administrator of the congregation***, and in cooperation with the Moderator of the congregation and the General Board, ***encourage orderly procedures in the life and work of the congregation in compliance with the congregation's Constitution and the policies & procedures of the congregation*** and General Board.

The Minister shall give ***special attention to the selection and training of the congregation's leaders.***

The Epistle to the Colossians is a Pauline epistle and the twelfth book of the New Testament of the Christian Bible. It was written, according to the text, by Paul the Apostle and Timothy, and addressed to the church in Colossae, a small Phrygian city near Laodicea and approximately 100 miles (160 km) from Ephesus in Asia Minor.

Many Scholars question Paul's authorship and attribute the letter to an early follower instead, but others still defend it as authentic. If Paul was the author, he probably used an amanuensis, or secretary, in writing the letter (Colossians 4:18), possibly Timothy.

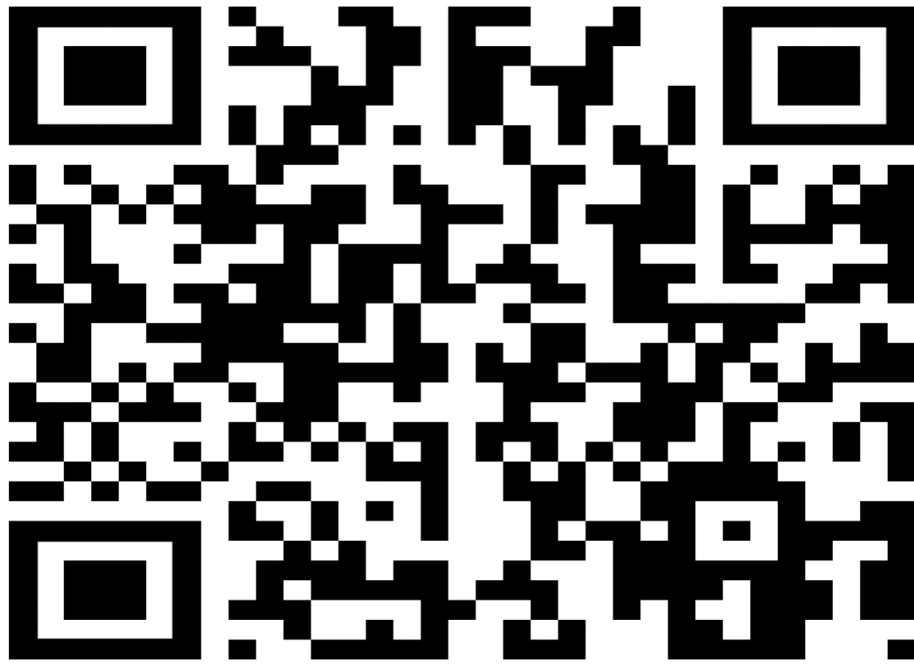
